Jamie Agombar

Jamie is the Executive Director of Students Organising for Sustainability (SOS-UK). SOS-UK is a new charity centered on repurposing the education system around the climate emergency and ecological crisis. The charity supports students to take the lead on sustainability, working together through youth-led campaigns like Teach the Future and Mock COP. Prior to joining SOS-UK, Jamie was Head of Sustainability at NUS for 15 years. Jamie is a Director of the Aldersgate Group, a Trustee of The Harmony Project and a Fellow of IEMA.



Eleanor Andrade May (they/them)

Eleanor Andrade May is a 20-year-old student, currently in their second year at Sheffield University. They have been part of Teach the Future and Students Organising for Sustainability UK since March 2020, organising digital communications surrounding the Climate Education Bill and other recent projects. During COP26, they met with Secretary of State for Education, Nadhim Zahawi, to discuss the Department for Education's Climate and Sustainability Draft Strategy. They have also worked on research with teachers into the current state of climate education, and led school-wide sustainability initiatives during their time in sixth form.

Co-founder and Chief Growth Officer of Twin Science & Robotics, Omer Gorgulu, has been selected in the top 50 volunteers among 50,000 applicants to work at one of Turkey's leading NGOs, YGA, initiating high-impact social initiative projects. During his volunteering years, he travelled to economically disadvantaged schools to deliver quality science education to more than 20,000 children.

After graduating, he continued to grow the science education project he volunteered for and led the financial transformation of YGA; he kick-started YGA Ventures, a social incubator centre for tech for good start-ups. YGA Ventures has accelerated five successful start-ups in woman empowerment, economic & social development of blind people,

sustainable tourism, sustainable energy, and education. Later, Omer and his co-founders transformed the social responsibility project they led into a start-up under YGA Ventures and founded Twin, delivering STEM-A for Sustainability education to children.

Sorcha Grant has been Associate Consultant at the Foundation for Education Development since April 2022. She attended two State Comprehensive schools in Redbridge and Barking and Dagenham. In 2017 she gained a place to study History at the University of Oxford and in 2020, she went on to study a Masters Degree at Durham University.

Co-founder and Chief Content Officer of Ed-Tech start-up Twin Science & Robotics, Cemil Cihan Özalevli started his career as a Mechanical Design Engineer in a defense industry company while doing his masters in solar energy technologies. He started working as a volunteer on YGA's World Science Movement project that aims to increase awareness about sustainability and climate education in 2011.

In 2013, he founded a solar energy company and implemented solar energy projects in Turkey. He was listed in MIT Innovators Under 35 and Forbes 30 Under 30. In the meantime, he led a team to develop Twin Science Kits to use in the World Science Movement project and hosted a TV show on CNN Turkish channel. He experienced the positive impact of using his skills for a better world firsthand. Cemil Cihan and his cofounders founded Twin Science and Robotics to raise double-winged children through STEM education for sustainable development.

As well as running the University of Gloucestershire's EdD programme, Paul leads research projects, one of which developed a competence framework for sustainability educators. Currently he chairs the Continuing Professional Development Forum for the Universities' Council for Teacher Education, is Trustee of the National Association for Environmental Education, a member of Teach the Future's Adult Advisory Board and Academic Advisor on education for sustainable development (ESD) to the UN Economic Commission for Europe's (UNECE). Formerly, he has been a teacher, worked on community-based sustainability projects in sub-Saharan Africa, ran an international NGO and helped draft the UNECE Strategy on ESD.



Carl Ward

Carl is Chief Executive of the City Learning Trust; a 3 to 19 Academy Trust in Staffordshire. He is also Chair of the Foundation for Education Development (FED). He has regional, national and international experience in education strategy, leadership development and school to school improvement.

In a career spanning 26 years in teaching, 18 of them in senior leadership, Carl has worked in a range of schools and organisations across a number of settings. Further to this, Carl was ASCL President in 2017-2018 and between 2009 and 2011, was part of the Prime Minister's Talent & Enterprise Taskforce. He has also advised the Number 10 policy unit on several aspects of education.
