Her novels 'Lascar' was published in 2012, and 'An Ayah's Choice' in 2022. She has contributed widely to print and online publications as well as BBC Radio.

She is a trustee of Cambridge Central Mosque, since 2017, which is Cambridge's first purpose-built mosque and Europe's first eco-mosque.

She has won numerous civic and cultural awards for her work such the 'Arts and Cultural Awareness Award' at the British Muslim Awards in 2015. Shahida has also sat on the judging panel of the Young Muslim Writers Awards.

GUEST BIOGRAPHIES



Professor Luis Franceschi

Professor Franceschi, LLB, LL.M, LL.D is the Assistant Secretary General of the Commonwealth. He coordinates the Political, Democracy, Electoral, Public Sector Governance, Good Offices, Rule of Law, Judicial Transformation, Human Rights, and Countering Violence and Extremism work in the 56 member countries. He is also the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting - CHOGM Conference Secretary, and, together with the Head of the Host Country Task Force, oversees the organisation and negotiations throughout the meeting.

Professor Franceschi was the founding Dean of Strathmore Law School. As a thinker, educator and writer, he loves positive and disruptive innovation. He was the recipient of the 2019 legal excellence CB Madan Award and the 2018 Utumishi Bora National Award. In 2019, he was a visiting scholar at the University of Oxford (<https://www.law.ox.ac.uk/people/luis-franceschi>) and U.C. Berkeley Law School. His area of expertise focuses on judicial transformation, comparative constitutional law and innovation in legal education. He has been a legal advisor to several national and international government agencies, including international and regional courts, the United Nations and the World Bank. He sits on several boards and has been a Governing Council Delegate and the Legal Advisor to the President of the Governing Council of the United Nations Environment Programme, where he co-drafted the UN Nairobi Declaration.

Prof Franceschi likes cycling, running and mountain climbing and has reached Point Lenana, Mt Kenya (5000 Meters ASL) 5 times, Uhuru Peak on Kilimanjaro (5895 Meters ASL) and the Rwenzori Mountains circuit (Uganda-Congo).



Professor Michelle Scobie

Dr. Michelle Scobie has been a lecturer and researcher at the Institute of International Relations and the Sir Arthur Lewis Institute for Social and Economic Studies at The University of the West Indies (UWI), St. Augustine and Co-Editor of the Caribbean Journal of International Relations and Diplomacy. She is an attorney at law with practice in Trinidad and Tobago and Venezuela.

Her research areas included global and regional environmental governance trends and challenges, especially in relation to institutional architectures relating to climate change, tourism, sustainable development, marine governance, private governance, environmental ethics and trade and environment - particularly from the developing states' perspective.

Revd Canon Dr C Bannister-Parker

Charlotte has held various positions at Oxford's University Church, including Priest in Charge and Director of Outreach. She is founder of the annual Oxford Interfaith Friendship Walk and the seminar "One Earth, Many Faiths". Charlotte is also an Advisor of The Oxford Foundation, which promotes youth interfaith dialogue and projects in the UK. She is a member of the Oxford Three Faiths Week, "Relating Across Divides" at St John's College, Oxford. Charlotte was Interim Rector of the city of Oxford 2017-2018, and she is a long-time Fellow of the RGS and RSA.

Charlotte for the past decade has chaired, and is currently President of, The Children's Radio Foundation (CRF), a non-profit development organisation training and empowering youth across eight countries in Africa. Charlotte has helped build up CRF following her ministerial posting in 2008 to Oxford's sister diocese in South Africa. Before being called to the priesthood, Charlotte spent fifteen years working in development NGOs and in broadcasting, with a focus on the role and education of women in South Asia.



Rabbi Dr Harvey Belovski

A pulpit rabbi for some 26 years, Harvey is now emeritus rabbi of the Golders Green Synagogue. He is a community leader, organisational psychologist and broadcaster, specialising in organisational development, leadership training and interfaith activism. He is the organisational consultant for the United Synagogue, chief strategist and rabbinic head of University Jewish Chaplaincy and advisor to several other organisations within and beyond the Jewish community. He sits on the community

and voluntary service committee of the honours system at the Cabinet Office and is a member of the Patient Safety Commissioner's advisory group. He is a regular live contributor to Pause for Thought on the BBC. Radio 2 Zoe Ball Breakfast Show.



Rabbi Shoshana Boyd-Gelfand

Shoshana is a rabbi, speaker and writer whose passion is bringing Jewish wisdom into the public square. For the past decade, she has served as a senior member of the Pears Foundation team, focusing her energy on building robust interfaith relationships and international development efforts. Shoshana also presents regularly on BBC Radio, teaches Hebrew Bible at Sarum College and serves as an officer of the International Jewish Committee on Interreligious Consultations, (the organisation that liaises on behalf of World Jewry with other international faith bodies, such as the Vatican and the World Council of Churches). In addition, Shoshana is the author of numerous articles on faith-based leadership as well as The Barefoot Book of Jewish Folk Tales, a collection of Jewish stories for all faiths and all ages.

Professor David Ford OBE

David is Regius Professor of Divinity Emeritus in the University of Cambridge and a Fellow of Selwyn College. He is married to Revd Deborah Ford (née Hardy), who is an Anglican priest and a psychotherapist; and they have three children, Rebecca, Rachel and Daniel, and two grandchildren.

He chairs Faith in Leadership, co-chairs the Rose Castle Foundation and serves on a range of boards relating to theology, education, learning disability, and interfaith relations.

He has just completed a twenty-year project with the publication of The Gospel of John. A Theological Commentary. Other publications include: A Kind of Upside-Downness: Learning Disabilities and Transformational Community, co-edited with Deborah Hardy Ford and Ian Randall; The Drama of Living; The Shape of Living; Theology: A Very Short Introduction; Christian Wisdom: Desiring God and Learning in Love; Shaping Theology: Engagements in a Religious and Secular World; The Modern Theologians. An introduction to Christian Theology since 1918 (3 Editions); and Self and Salvation: Being Transformed. He has been a theological adviser to three Archbishops of Canterbury (Runcie, Carey, Welby), and has honorary

doctorates from the universities of Birmingham, Dev Sanskriti Vishwavidyalaya (Haridwar), Aberdeen and Bolton.

Dr Matthew Freeman



Matthew is the founder of Dialectix Consulting, a Virginia, US based firm that works with organisations on their diversity, equity and inclusion strategies. Matthew's passion for equity and social justice has led him across the United States and around the globe, helping people connect across difference and begin to address the challenges that divide them. 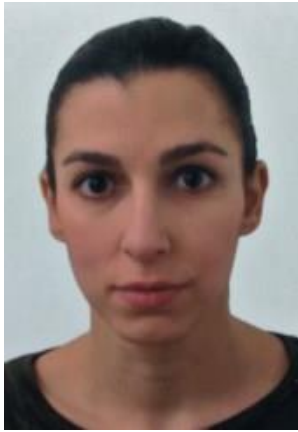
Robbie Leigh



Robbie Leigh is an Anglican theologian and educationalist currently serving as a consultant to the Rose Castle Foundation, a peacebuilding organisation working with faith-formed leaders to navigate challenging divides and transform conflict.

Robbie's interest in interfaith engagement and peacebuilding developed while undertaking doctoral research on the theology of reconciliation at the University of Cambridge, under the supervision of Professor David Ford. Working closely with the Cambridge Interfaith Programme and participating in Scriptural Reasoning during this time was profoundly influential, inspiring Robbie to contribute to a range of projects promoting the dignity of difference in order to meet the challenges of a complexly religious and secular world.

After completing his PhD, he became a teacher and served as Head of Religion and Philosophy at Highgate School. In 2019 he founded a cross-sector network of academics and educationalists working to offer young people better opportunities to engage their intellect and deepest values through the study of religion. Since 2013 he has worked with Global Covenant Partners, a non-profit organisation dedicated to supporting the victims of religion-related violence. He was a military intelligence analyst in the British Army Reserves for six years. Robbie continues to teach theology at the St Albans Cathedral Study Centre.



Alex Martins

Alex is an independent researcher, facilitator, advocate and Co-Founder of The Equity Index, a UK-based social enterprise. She has served as a Strategic Advisor to Faith in Leadership since 2018. Alex is passionate about creating a more equitable international development sector. She facilitates discussions between diverse groups of stakeholders from both the global South and North and is trained in participatory facilitation techniques including Group Facilitation Methods & Open Space Technology. She advocates for greater equity in the international development sector, with a focus on the intersection between racial and gender equity and equitable partnerships, taking into account power imbalances resulting from historical and neo-colonial dynamics. Born in Johannesburg, she was raised in South Africa and Brazil and is currently based in London, UK.



Krish Raval

Michael is Executive Chair of the Religion Media Centre an Independent resource helping journalists and others cover stories related to religion and belief. He is a founder director of the Religion and Belief Literacy Partnership working with organisations such as the House of Commons, Tesco and Marks and Spencer to accommodate religion and belief in the workplace. He is also an Executive Producer at TBI Media one of the most successful independent production companies in the country. Michael has worked with Krish on the Senior Faith in Leadership Programme since it began in 2012 and serves on the faculty with a particular role in media training - something he also does with major Religious organisations. Dr Tamra Wright

She previously held visiting lectureships and research fellowships at Oxford, Cambridge and King's College London, as well as directing the academic programme at the London School of Jewish Studies for two decades.
